This becomes even more important if you are hoping to go into a field where there is a shortage of skills. As a learner, you must know the scope of opportunities that exist at Further Education and Training Colleges, the learnerships offered by the Sector Education and Training Authorities (SETAs) and training offered by other public sector organisations in addition to the more traditional offerings from universities and universities of technology.

I encourage you to make use of the information offered in this booklet and to apply early for the post-school option of your choice!

GETTING STARTED: CHOOSING A CAREER

Decisions about careers are very important. Therefore they must be taken with care and consideration whenever they occur throughout life. This booklet will provide you with some pointers that will help you in making this decision. We also encourage you to consult with and seek advice from other career-related sources.

In order to make an informed career choice you need to know a number of things, namely:

- Yourself (self-knowledge):
- The world of work; and
- Training and learning opportunities.

SELF-KNOWLEDGE

People are different and look for different things in jobs. For instance some people are artistic and creative in nature and therefore thrive in environments that encourage creativity. These people tend to feel limited by rules and do not like routine. Others are exactly the opposite,

preferring an environment with clear expectations and rules.

You must also know your values and interests. Values are things that are important to you, and are mostly influenced by family, religion, school, etc. Some people enjoy careers that give them the opportunity to lead or guide, whilst others prefer careers that allow them to work independently.

Interests are those things that you enjoy and like doing. An individual who likes working with money could consider a career in accounting, whilst someone who enjoys working with their hands and machines could consider a career in engineering or surgery.

In addition you may have skills you learnt from your family, like fixing cars, cooking, drawing, etc. You may want to consider these when making a career choice, especially if you are good at them.

THE WORLD OF WORK

In addition to knowing about yourself, you need to know about the world of work and career opportunities that exist. This means that you need to do some basic research about the career that you are interested in.

How and where can one find information about the world of work? You may want to check out the following:

- Printed publications e.g. Khetha Post School Career Guide publication and other resource publications. These may be available at your local library, on the Internet or from your Life Orientation Teacher
- Web-based resources such as websites and career-related blogs
- Employers and professional bodies
- People in your community such as teachers, librarians, social workers, etc.

TRAINING AND LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Now that you have explored your personality type and the type of career you are interested in, you need to know what type of training and learning will enable you to enter into that career.

In the chapters that follow we will give you information about these training and learning opportunities, which;

- Are at different levels (Certificate, Diploma or Degree)
- Could be academic or vocational
- Have different entry requirements (including subject mix and pass mark)
- Have different durations (from a few months to a few years)
- May be part-time or full-time
- May be offered through distance, online or contact sessions.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEARNING AT FET COLLEGES

Further Education and Training (FET) Colleges offer National Certificates (Vocational) [NC(V)] and NATED (N) qualifications. The training programmes provided at FET Colleges are aimed at developing vocational skills that are needed in the South African economy.

There are currently 50 Public FET Colleges, with 264 learning campuses across the country that currently cater for approximately 650,000 students.

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL CERTIFICATE (VOCATIONAL) QUALIFICATION?

The National Certificate Vocational [NC(V)] is offered in a variety of vocational fields at NQF Levels 2, 3 and 4. An NC(V) qualification will take you three years to complete. An NC(V) provides both theory and practical experience in a particular field. NC(V) Level 4 is on the same level as the National Senior Certificate on NQF Level 4, but is more closely aligned to the workplace.

Some of the fields in which NC(V) is offered are: finance, economics and accounting, engineering and related design, civil engineering and building construction, office administration, primary agriculture, process plant operations, process instrumentation, electrical infrastructure construction, management and marketing.

You need to have at least passed Grade 9 to enrol into a NC(V) level 2 qualification. Each of these qualifications also have other entry requirements. You are required to have, for instance, mathematics at Grade 9 for entry into engineering related courses.

NATED (N) QUALIFICATIONS?

Colleges offer NATED qualifications in a variety of areas such as business management, mechanical engineering etc. NATED courses are also theoretical components of the apprenticeship training programmes.

NATED qualifications are also offered per semester and trimester, so you will have the opportunity to apply at various times during the year.

FUNDING

DHET FET Colleges Bursaries are available at each of the 50 Public FET Colleges. See Chapter 4 on funding.

WHAT ABOUT PRIVATE COLLEGES?

There are many private colleges that offer different qualifications. Remember to check with the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) if a college and its courses are registered.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEARNING AT UNIVERSITIES, UNIVERSITIES OF TECHNOLOGY AND COMPREHENSIVE UNIVERSITIES

In addition to study options at FET Colleges, there are 23 universities in South Africa. Spaces for study at these higher education institutions are limited and competition is tough. So study hard and **Apply Now!**

Universities are institutions of higher learning and offer qualifications such as certificates, diplomas and degrees. The learning is academic, with either a professional, vocational or career-orientation.

Undergraduate studies can lead to a higher certificate, diploma or a degree. Students who want to specialise further can study for post graduate or advanced diplomas, Honours, Masters or Doctoral degrees. Universities equip graduates for anything from science, engineering and medicine to law, business, teaching and acting. Courses can last for periods ranging from twelve months to six years.

CLOSING DATES

Most tertiary institutions close new applications from August annually for study in the following year, while others close as early as May.

PRIVATE HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS

There are a wide range of Private Higher Education Institutions (PHEIs) that offer a selection of higher education qualifications, mostly certificates but also diplomas and degrees. Prospective students should check with DHET whether the institution is registered and its offerings are accredited. Some providers, private and public, do sometimes offer qualifications that are not accredited. So the fact that a provider is registered does not necessarily mean that all of its qualifications are accredited.

WHAT DO I NEED TO APPLY TO A UNIVERSITY?

- Ensure that you meet the requirements before applying
- Obtain the application form and complete it fully
- Supply either or both of your Grade 11 final results and your Grade 12 June results
- Pay an application fee that is usually nonrefundable.

Note: Each university sets its own admission requirements.

Please note that when you apply to some universities in KZN you have to apply through the Central Applications Office (CAO) for new applications.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUR STUDIES

There are a number of funding options available to South African students. In order to access higher learning, students may have to consider these options to fund their studies. Remember that bursaries are mostly non-repayable and that loan options are repayable. You might need your parents/guardian to enter into this contract on your behalf.

BURSARIES

A bursary offers financial aid to students who want to further their studies. Bursaries differ in what they cover e.g. some pay for tuition fees, accommodation fees, prescribed books and travel expenses, whilst others may only cover tuition fees. Please note that most bursaries are awarded based on financial need and good performance. For more information, you can visit the Financial Aid Office or Student Centre of the institution where you want to study.

NSFAS

The main function of the National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS) is to provide loans and bursaries to deserving students who need financial assistance to pay for their studies at public universities and Further Education and Training (FET) Colleges in South Africa. A student can only apply for funding from NSFAS once she or he is a registered student of any public (not private) institution of higher learning. For more information, you can visit the Financial Aid Office at the institution to which you have been admitted.

You can apply if you are a South African citizen and your household income is less than R122 000 per annum. If your parents are not employed you must produce an affidavit from the Police Station.

STUDY LOANS FROM BANKS AND OTHER AGENCIES


Most South African banks and legal agencies offer study loans for which students can apply. It will help to enquire from several banks so you can compare interest rates and payment options. Please be careful of unscrupulous financing options.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are awarded based on merit. There is also a high level of competition for these scholarships. This type of funding may come from various companies, embassies and foundations. Often when a company gives you a scholarship to cover your university costs you will have to work for them for a specified length of time after graduating.

Basic things to remember when applying for any financial assistance:

- Include certified ID copies, proof of residence and proof of employment for both parents
- Provide affidavits from South African Police Service where required.

LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH THE SETAS

Sector Education and Training Authorities (SETAs) were established by government to increase the skills of people in each economic sector. There are 21 SETAs in South Africa and they offer the following post school options:

LEARNERSHIPS

A learnership refers to a structured learning programme where learners have to attend classes at an institution, like a college or training centre to complete classroom-based learning and they have to complete on-the-job training in a workplace in addition to writing a trade exam. The idea is that learners on a learnership learn the skills for a trade by doing the work under the guidance of an experienced and qualified person. In order to become qualified themselves, learners are assessed against occupational standards that have been agreed in advance by industry stakeholders. This leads to a qualification registered on the National Qualifications Framework (NQF). Unemployed people can only participate in a learnership if there is an employer that is prepared to provide the required work experience. The duration of learnerships vary.

APPRENTICESHIPS

A modern apprenticeship is a formal training approach, combining classroom instruction and on the job training, through which a learner can become a recognised artisan within a technical field (trade) such as - a welder, plumber, fitter, mechanic and electrician.

Learners accepted on an apprenticeship are required to pass the relevant modular and phase tests, as well as a final trade test to be recognised as a qualified artisan. During the apprenticeship the learner will also be require to gain practical experience through working closely with a qualified and experienced artisan/s.

Apprenticeships have differing application dates, selection criteria and lengths of duration depending on the learning requirements related to each technical field/trade.



Apprenticeships are seen as one of the key ways of assisting Government to ensure the nation has the necessary skilled workforce to support its infrastructure development plans.

SKILLS PROGRAMMES

Skills programmes are occupationally based programmes presented by an accredited

provider. The purpose of skills programmes are to provide learners with practical (hands-on) experience where appropriate, increase their employability, possibly equip them to be self employed and promote their mobility in the workplace. Every sector has its own criteria for skills programmes, and learners must ensure that they obtain this information from the accredited providers.

HOW TO APPLY FOR LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH THE SETAS:

- Obtain information about learnerships, apprenticeships and skills programmes from the SETAs and the Department of Labour
- Go to your nearest Labour Centre and register as a work seeker and obtain further information about available work opportunities. To register online visit https://essa.labour.gov.za/EssaOnline/Web Beans/
- Be on the lookout for advertised learning opportunities and submit your application as indicated in the advertisement.
- You must enter into a formal agreement with a provider, and sign the learnership agreement

PUBLIC SERVICE TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

Some government departments offer postschool education and training opportunities. This is often through colleges and centres for capacity development. Graduates from these colleges are often specifically recruited to work for these government departments.

Although some of these opportunities may only require a Grade 12 pass, they may at times have other additional requirements.

You will need to find out more about these opportunities at the respective government departments listed below. Also be on the lookout for intake opportunities, which are usually advertised in newspapers.

Please make early enquiries with the different government departemnts below about the opportunities they offer.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENCE

SCARCE SKILLS: OPPORTUNITIES IN DEMAND

Scarce skills refer to those skills needed in particular occupations/jobs where they are in short supply. This is where there are insufficient skilled people to meet current or future labour market demands, either because such skilled people are not available or they are available but do not meet the employment criteria. Studying for entry into any of these careers might offer rewards and job opportunities upon completion.


Critical skills refer to abilities that are of especially great importance across a range of different jobs/occupations. These include general management skills, communication and customer handling skills, teamwork skills and communication technology skills.

Scarce skills also differ in these ways:

Absolute scarcity refers to jobs for which skilled people are not available in the labour market such as actuarial scientists and instrumentation.

Relative scarcity refers to jobs for which suitably skilled people are available but who may not necessarily have a high level of work experience located within a specific geographical location and equity considerations, e.g. fewer women in engineering and science related careers



OPPORTUNITIES FOR SELF-EMPLOYMENT

WHAT IS ENTREPRENEURSHIP?

Are you driven, enterprising and involved in some form of income generation? Have you ever started a business or sold certain products? If yes, maybe a small business start-up is for you!

All the great and small businesses around us started as just an idea. Most successful businesses start with an idea and an understanding of a market need that others do not notice.

DO I NEED A UNIVERSITY DEGREE TO START A BUSINESS?

No, but you do need to acquire important business skills. It is difficult to run a successful business without the necessary training or skills. You can contact the National Youth Development Agency (NYDA), The Small Enterprise Development Agency (Seda) and others for advice and support.

ITHUBALENTSHA MICRO ENTERPRISE PROGRAMME (ITHUBALENTSHA)

Ithubalentsha is an isi-Zulu word meaning 'opportunities for young people'. This programme offers a holistic and integrated service aimed at ensuring the success of young people's businesses. Ithubalentsha does the following:

- Provides technical training to potential entrepreneurs
- Provides business management training to

- all young people participating in the programme
- Supports young peoples' businesses through micro enterprise loans, ranging from R1,000 to R100,000
- Assigns business mentors to potential entrepreneurs
- Assists to establish business opportunities and market linkages.

OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH COMMUNITY SERVICE

Exciting opportunities for personal growth and development are also available when participating in community service. Community service is when a person gives of their time to do something, generally without pay, that benefits community members. This is often called volunteering. And the good news is that volunteering can benefit you in many ways including:

- Improving your skills and knowledge: volunteers are often trained in a variety of areas and have plenty of time to practice these skills
- Improving your social networks and skills: when you get involved in volunteering opportunities you make new friends and improve your social skills
- Exposing you to the working environment: volunteering may expose you to what the working environment may be like
- Enhancing your CV and employability: your training and the experience you gain as a volunteer will go into your CV and help

- improve your chances of employment and admission into other programmes
- The most important benefit for you may be in character development: volunteer opportunities help build patience, confidence, compassion and hard work. These are important to develop to become a successful adult and responsible citizen of this beautiful country.

You can make a difference in other people's lives and gain a lot of benefit at the same time. Volunteer opportunities may exist in an orphanage, health care, building projects, substance abuse and trauma counselling, etc. Being a volunteer requires patience and commitment to community development.

You may be required to look for opportunities, so don't give up too quickly. Below is a brief introduction of a well-known volunteer programme. This will not cover all opportunities that are available in your local areas so ask your teacher, community development worker or

parent for local opportunities. If you can't find any - think about what you and a group of your friends can start that will make a difference in the lives of others.

NATIONALLEVEL

Opportunities are available through the National Youth Service (NYS). NYS is a project aimed at offering young people opportunities to contribute in a positive and meaningful way to the community in which they live.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE NYS?

Any unemployed youth aged between 18 and 35, with a progress report from Grade 10 and above.

HOW IS IT DIFFERENT FROM INTERNSHIPS AND LEARNERSHIPS?

Much like learnerships and internships, NYS offers young people the chance of structured

learning. It is, however, different from learnerships and internships in that the emphasis is on community services and volunteering. NYS offers volunteers a very small fee (referred to as a stipend).

HOW CAN ONE ACCESS OPPORTUNITIES CREATED BY THE NYS?

Whenever opportunities are available for the youth, advertisements are posted in local newspapers, at the Department of Labour, as well as on the NYS website. Also visit your local municipality or local library for more information.

Before registering at any institution, learners should ensure that the qualification on offer is registered on the NQF and accredited. The institution offering the qualification must be accredited by the relevant Quality Council. This is critical as all qualifications and part-qualifications must be registered on the NQF for them to be nationally recognised and thus have real value.
